
## From the PASTOR'S DESK

# Faith or Foolishness?

A FRIEND OF MINE ONCE stated: "There's a fine line between faith and foolishness." That self-made proverb struck home with me. Since then I have pondered how close we come to "tempting God" by trying to force faith for God's deliverance.

In His face-off with Satan, Jesus gave a stern rebuttal to one of the temptations put before Him (that of throwing Himself off of the top of the Temple with the "assurance" that His Father would not allow Him to be killed): "It is written, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test' (Luke 4:12, NIV)."

Yet, we are instructed to have faith, and that "without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Hebrews 11:6, NIV).



There is no doubt (pun intended!) that we need more faith, stronger faith, improved faith. Not a "forced" faith, not a conjured up faith—which isn't really faith. But a faith that flows from a heart and mind tuned to God through His inspired Word. A faith that can only come about by the study and assimilation of God's Word as the basis and stimulus of that faith. "Consequently, faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17, NIV). Satan used Scripture to tempt Jesus; by the same token Jesus used Scripture (albeit with honesty and understanding) to resist Satan.

Does the comic strip (below) illustrate the abysmal lack of Bible knowledge in many people? The Peanuts humor reminds me of the song ". . . don't know much about geometry. . ."

The truth is, that charting one's course by faith requires the Holy Scripture. "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching the faith and correcting error, for resetting the direction of a man's life and training in good living" (1 Timothy 3:16, JBP). ~ JDM

In Revelation 10:7, John through his vision foretells the day when the mystery shall be finished, concluded.... a mystery no more. Faith is the substance of that which we cannot define and the day is coming when the fruit of our faith shall be borne. For now, we accept that God knows what He's doing and we look forward to seeing with the eyes of God in the fulfillment of the mystery of the Kingdom!

## A More Excellent Way

I was recently reminded of the old adage that only your best friends tell you when your breath smells.

Shortly after President Bush announced Samuel Alito's nomination, a senior U.S. senator sympathetic to Christian causes called me. "I know this will sound strange," he began, "but could you get some of your conservative religious friends to downplay their support for Judge Alito?" . . . This kind of talk could kill Alito's chances, the senator warned. . . . which tells us that media-driven stereotypes about the Religious Right have stuck. . . . Whether the stereotypes are fair or not, though, it's time to take some of the criticism to heart. . . . To seek political victories in [a] heavy-handed way is not only a bad witness; it's also unwise. Ultimately, we need both political victories and cultural support.

To change the culture, therefore, we must learn how to engage the political process more winsomely. It will require a different mindset. We'll need to recognize that we're appealing to hearts and minds, not twisting arms. In fact as well as in appearance, [as] we are not seeking to impose, but rather to propose. We're not demanding something for ourselves; we are inviting a hungry and needy world to come to Christ and find goodness and fullness of life. . . .

This means, first, loving those we contend against in the political process. Martin Luther King Jr. said, "Whom you would change, you must first love." Some Christian leaders do get this.

Second, we offer our strongest witness when we demonstrate that we do love others . . . When the world sees us working for human rights, we earn moral authority that blunts the "imposing your morality" attacks in the public square. . . . But we must remember as we do this that we are proposing a more excellent way to a needy society, and that we do so in love, no matter how much abuse is heaped upon us.

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
