
Thanks to Martha McClenagan for sharing her musical gifts with us so that we may lift up our voices in songs of praise.

IT IS EASY TO GET DISCOURAGED in the work of the Lord. "Be not weary in well doing" is an apt charge from the Apostle Paul. And it is easy to stagnate. Sometimes we say: "What's the use? Why do so much work for so few?" But my Okie farm background has instilled in me that you have to keep planting if you want a harvest. Even if you have to "dust in in"—a saying that spoke of insufficient moisture to put the seeds in the soil. But "there is a time to sow and a time to reap." (Eccl. 3) It is often human nature to focus on the crop failures instead of the successes. Our disappointments, however, shouldn't overpower our times of rejoicing. Here are the words of an old hymn that reinforces this principle:

Sowing in the morning, sowing seeds of kindness,

Sowing in the noon-tide, and the dewy eves;

Waiting for the harvest and the time of reaping,

We shall come rejoicing, bringing in the sheaves.

Sowing in the sunshine, sowing in the shadows,
