IT IS WRITTEN

A few weeks ago a Bible was found in the alley trash receptacle in our city of Amarillo, Texas. The Bible was published in 1818! It was in four parts and inside was a family tree which enabled the finder to locate a local family who was part of that linage.

What a discovery, I thought.

Then the sadness of it swept over me. Not only because of the disregard for a virtual treasure, but for the blatant disrespect for Holy Writ.

Anciently, the Hebrews were given a charge to verbally pass on their heritage to their children. This command from the Almighty was respected and obeyed much of the time. It began verbally: "God spoke to our forefathers through the prophets at many times and in various ways" (Hebrews 1:1). And they passed it on verbally: ". . . men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit" (2 Peter 1:19-21).

Then the ancient ones, like Job, would declare, "Oh that my words were now written! oh that they were printed in a book! That they were graven with an iron pen and lead in the rock for ever!" (Job 19:23-24). "My tongue is the pen of a ready writer," the psalmist wrote (Psalm 45:1).

Fortunately, specially appointed scribes recorded the history entwined with a special message for future generations: "Then the LORD said to Moses, "Write this on a scroll as something to be remembered . . ." (Exodus 17:14); "Moreover the LORD said unto me, Take thee a great roll, and write in it with a man's pen" (Isa. 8:1). "Go now, write it on a tablet for them, inscribe it on a scroll, that for the days to come it may be an everlasting witness" (Isaiah 30:8). Israel's kings were to copy it and read it: "When he takes the throne of his kingdom, he is to write for himself on a scroll a copy of this law, taken from that of the priests, who are Levites" (Deuteronomy 17:18).

"'Yes,' Baruch replied, 'he (Jeremiah) dictated all these words to me, and I wrote them in ink on the scroll. . .'" (Jeremiah 36:18). Yet, oftentimes inspired writings are denigrated and disregarded: ". . . the pen of the scribes is in vain" (Jeremiah 8:8)—as is illustrated by the king's reaction to it in the 36th chapter of Jeremiah.

So you and I continue to write words of inspiration and hope, words of grace and beauty, words of life. We may not fit into the special category of the prophets and apostles, but we can certainly give our words credibility by writing in concert with their writings. Our words may not be preserved for future generations, but we can write from the heart and learn to do it well.

Is your writing prompted by an undeniable urge, a fiery passion? Jeremiah's was: "His word is in my heart like a fire, a fire shut up in my bones. I am weary of holding it in; indeed, I cannot" (Jeremiah 20:9b).

And write we must!

God reminds us of the past lest we get into a shallow security in the present.

the flight of impulsive thoughtlessness, but with the patient power of knowing that the God of Israel will go before us. Our yesterdays present irreparable things to us; it is true that we have lost opportunities which will never return, but God can transform this destructive anxiety into a constructive thoughtfulness for the future. Let the past sleep, but let it sleep on the bosom of Christ.

Leave the Irreparable Past in His hands, and step out into the Irresistible Future with Him.



Stoic and Cynic philosophers often praised "having nothing."


Purposeful living is illusive to millions of people in the world. The dual clouds of skepticism and cynicism hang over their heads — much like Solomon of old: "Again I observed all the oppression that takes place in our world. I saw the tears of the oppressed, with no one to comfort them. The oppressors have great power, and the victims are helpless. So I concluded that the dead are better off than the living. And most fortunate of all are those who were never born. For they have never seen all the evil that is done in our world" (Eccl 4:1-3,NLT).

But God's revelation to man is that He has a plan that is eternal: "For his Holy Spirit speaks to us deep in our hearts and tells us that we are God's children. And since we are his children, we will share his treasures—for everything God gives to his Son, Christ, is ours, too. But if we are to share his glory, we must also share his suffering. I read an interesting article by Joan Esherick reinforcing the importance of realistic goal setting. It's not some magical formula, but rather a logical approach that I imagine matches advice you've heard before, maybe from Mom or Dad.

- 1) Be specific. You can't just say, "I want to grow in Bible knowledge", you have to have a plan. It may be dedicating a specific length of time daily devoted to reading and studying scripture. It may be enrolling in some Bible study course. It may be attending and participating in the Church's weekly Bible class. It may be in dedicating time with family or friends for Biblical discussion and introspection.
- 2) Be realistic. The greatest enemy of resolutions is unrealistic goals. If our goals and resolutions overwhelm us, then we are not living within the limits and boundaries God has created for us. We are mortal, human beings. We need to eat, exercise, get suf-

- 3) Include a way to measure your success. A good goal will answer the questions of what, how, and when; it's measurable.
- 4) Think short-term and long-term. Shortterm goals (cleaning one closet a week) allow us to experience success at smaller intervals while working toward long-term goals (decluttering an entire house).
- 5) Be flexible. Sometimes there are set- business. You'll be glad you did. backs, such as an personal illness or in the family, lost job, devastating accident. So many things can derail the best laid plans. Life can, deed, get in the way of our ideals.

6) Review periodically. Regular review allows us to stay on course, track our progress, and adjust course as necessary. You might wish to record your goals in a date book/planner; you can list specific objectives by category: personal/spiritual; marriage/family; professional; ministry; house/projects. Businesses routinely look at monthly financial statements, to determine whether or not the business is showing a profit or a loss, whether or not it is succeeding or failing in its goals. In our personal lives, our statements of goal profit or loss might involve some questions you can use as a

Which are frustrating me? Can I be more flexible? Have circumstances changed since I set this goal? Is my goal realistic? Specific? Measurable? If not, what could I change to make it more so?
