19:35-36, LB). It's all about character and reputation. As you declared: 'A sterling reputation is better than striking it rich.' (Proverbs 22:1a, Msg) 'The integrity of the honest keeps them on track.' 'Truth lasts,' you affirmed; but 'lies are here today, gone tomorrow' (Proverbs 12:19, Msg). Even though lies are transitory, the effect lives on.

"Man can overcome this Satan-induced predisposition to lying an dishonesty. However, some 'have lied so well and for so long that they've lost their capacity for truth' (1 Timothy 4:2, Msg.). It still goes to the heart of the person, as I just stated.

"I challenge each person who is a God-follower: 'Tell your neighbor the truth . . . When you lie to others, you end up lying to yourself' (Eph 4:25, Msg.). So 'don't lie to one another. You're done with the old life' (Col. 3:9, Msg.).

"There is no character flaw in God: 'We find God utterly reliable and straightforward' (1 John 4:8, JBP). 'So, my dear children, don't let anyone divert you from the truth. It's the person who *acts* right who *is* right' (1 John 3:7a, Msg.). Being honest should be a way of life—honest with oneself, honest with God, honest with others!"

Solomon sat spellbound by the words of his Lord and God. (Solomon wrote many proverbs about honesty in relation to business dealings; note: 3:27-28; 6:1-5, 30-31; 10:16; 11:1-6, 15, 18; 12:3, 5; 14:9; 15:27; 16:8, 11; 17:8, 18, 23; 19:1; 20:16-17, 21, 23; 21:3, 6; 22:7, 26-27.)

⁷ On that night God appeared to Solomon, and said to him, "Ask! What shall I give you?" ⁸ And Solomon said to God: "You have shown great mercy to David my father, and have made me king in his place. ⁹ Now, O LORD God, let Your promise to David my father be established, for You have made me king over a people like the dust of the earth in multitude. ¹⁰ Now give me wisdom and knowledge, that I may go out and come in before this people; for who can judge this great people of Yours?" ¹¹ And God said to Solomon: "Because this was in your heart, and you have not asked riches or wealth or honor or the life of your enemies, nor have you asked long life--but have asked wisdom and knowledge for yourself, that you may judge My people over whom I have made you king-- ¹² wisdom and knowledge *are*

"So we lie to ourselves first, don't we?" Solomon's insight seemed more acute today. "Then to others as we find it 'expedient.'" He had unrolled the scroll: "'A good man's mind is filled with honest thoughts; an evil man's mind is crammed with lies.' But 'Truth stands the test of time; lies are soon exposed.'" (Prv. 12:5, 19, LB)

"It does begin in the mind, as you have written. And I inspired one of my prophets to write: 'The heart is desperately wicked, who can know it?' (Jeremiah 17:9) And after him I stated, 'It is the thought-life that pollutes. For from within, out of men's hearts, come evil thoughts of lust, theft, murder, adultery, wanting what belongs to others, wickedness, deceit, lewdness, envy, slander, pride, and all other folly. All these things come from within; they are what pollute you and make you unfit for God' (Mark 7:20-23, LB).

"You, too, Solomon, expressed the spirit of my law when you wrote: 'Don't talk out of both sides of your mouth. Avoid careless banter, white lies, gossip' (Proverbs 4:24a, Msg.); 'An honest life shows respect for God; a degenerate life is a slap in his face' (Proverbs 14:2, Msg.)."

Solomon smiled with self-approval. Then, abruptly, became sober. He was beginning to realize how proud he was of his writings, and how humble he should be feeling since he was merely the instrument of the Unseen Muse. Using a gift from the Giver.

"That agrees with another principle you gave me," he said: "'God-loyal people, living honest lives' (Proverbs 20:7a, Msg.)."

"'Respect for God.' 'God-loyal.'" Jesus sighed, gazing across the meadow as if he were watching the unrolled scroll of history. "Sad to say, this has been society's deficiency through the ages. The character flaws of dishonesty and lying have been apparent in mankind down through history. My Father in Heaven is unhappy about this: 'God's angry displeasure erupts as acts of human mistrust and wrongdoing and lying accumulate, as people try to put a shroud over truth!' (Romans 1:18, Msg.) Truth-based living will always bring positive results."

Solomon had found three more applicable proverbs: "'God is more pleased when we are just and fair than when we give him gifts. Pride, lust, and evil actions are all sin (Prv. 21:3-5, LB.' 'Lies will get any man into trouble, but honesty is its own defense. Telling the truth gives a man great satisfaction, and hard work returns many blessings to him (Prv. 12:13-14, LB).' 'God cares about honesty in the workplace. Your business is his business (Prv. 16:11, Msg).' " He looked up from his reading.

"You gave a lot of thought to your writing, didn't you?"

"Well . . . yes, I did. But you know that I was but an instrument of your Spirit."

Jesus smiled. "But I also created your mind, and it is meant to be used in concert with my Spirit. You also spent time meditating on my Word to Israel about the principle of honesty and impartiality: 'You must be impartial in judgment. Use accurate measures—lengths, weights, and volumes—and give full measure, for I am Jehovah your God' (Leviticus

"We've spent quite a few hours speaking of the proper perspective regarding riches." That brings to mind your proverb that states that 'a sterling reputation is better than striking it rich.' I think that should be our topic today: character, with an emphasis on honesty and truthfulness."

The crunch of the fresh apple echoed Solomon's nod of agreement. His mind raced as he uncovered his parchment. He began to recall many of the things he had written about this topic.

"Where shall we begin, Great One?"

"At the beginning . . . of this world. When the father of liars showed up on the scene. When the Evil One, Satan, performed the first dishonest act involving humanity. Once he had drawn Adam and Eve into the same lying and dishonesty, the pattern was set for all of humanity. Once they had caved in to the initial temptation, the next impulse was to deny responsibility for their actions. Guilt produced embarrassment, and embarrassment evoked excuses and dishonesty. When I asked Adam if he had eaten of the forbidden fruit, he admitted it, 'but,' he said, 'it was the woman you gave me who brought me some, and I ate it.' When I asked the woman how she could do such a thing, she excused herself by saying, 'The serpent tricked me.'"

"Since you came, Mr. Murphey, our church has lost some of its dignity," Dorothy said as she served me tea from an ornate silver pot resting on a silver tray. And with the next breath she asked, "Milk or sugar, Mr. Murphey?"

"One lump, please," and I reached for the cup.

"We had such—such quiet dignity before you came. I don't want to hurt your feelings in telling you all of this. But..."

I had been the pastor of the church less than four months before she and her two sisters invited me to tea. For the next forty minutes the three of them tried to help me see the error of my ways. They didn't seem interested that we had added new members or that attendance by members had increased. Their concern was the loss of decorum.

Dorothy smiled as she offered me a cookie from a silver plate. "And another thing..." She looked at a pad of paper on which she and her sisters had written a number of items.

As I walked out of the house, depression weighted me down. Their criticism hurt. I sat in my car for several minutes and prayed in deep anguish. By the end of the day, however, I had grasped one significant fact about those three sisters. They were God's grace builders in my life.

Since that I've realized that every church, company, and neighborhood has at least one grace builder. They serve a divine purpose: They teach us invaluable lessons about patience and longsuffering. They force us to grow spiritually. Grace builders drive us to pray more fervently and to scrutinize our motives. Maybe they do more for us than all the sweet, kind, and encouraging people we encounter.

Grace builders: I've known many of them. Like Johnny. He pats me on the back and sounds friendly. He makes everything into a joke so that means I can't get angry—not even when he insults me. Even when he ridicules me. I'm not paranoid; I don't feel persecuted. But I have enough sense to know when a person insults me even though hiding behind jokes and light-hearted humor.

For the past 25 years I've been a full-time writer and I haven't escaped those grace builders. They email to remind me that they discovered a misspelled word on page 197 of my latest book (as if I yearned to know that or could do anything about it once the book is in print). Or one woman said, "You're a decent writer, not as good as _____."

We all have our grace builders. Our occupation doesn't matter. And, as much as I hate to admit it, they make life miserable enough for us that we pray and realize how much we have to depend on God's help. They serve a practical, spiritual function.

I don't like the grace builders in my life. I try to avoid some of them as much as possible. With others, I grit my teeth and face them. When I think of the grace builders at work in my life I have several words to describe them: They're obnoxious, self-centered, opinionated, and demanding. Without them I could accomplish more, and feel better about life and—or could I?

Probably not: They serve a practical purpose: They are God's gifts to make us grow. And we all have them. Which makes me wonder: Whose grace builder am I?


