

As I said, we had the opportunity to take an exciting journey to Europe to celebrate this milestone and we thoroughly enjoyed



In the United States, Independence Day, commonly known as the Fourth of July, is a federal holiday commemorating the adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4,1776, declaring independence from the Kingdom of Great Britain. Independence Day is commonly associated with fireworks, parades, barbecues, carnivals, fairs, picnics, concerts, baseball games, political speeches and ceremonies, and various other public and private events celebrating the history, government, and traditions of the United States. Independence Day is the national day of the United States

During the American Revolution, the legal separation of the American colonies from Great Britain occurred on July 2,1776, when the Second Continental Congress voted to approve a resolution of independence that had been proposed in June by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia. After voting for independence, Congress turned its attention to the Declaration of Independence, a statement explaining this decision, which had been prepared by a Committee of Five, with Thomas Jefferson as its principal author. Congress debated and revised the Declaration, finally approving it on July 4. A day earlier, John Adams had written to his wife Abigail:

"The second day of July, 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more."

Adams' prediction was off by two days. From the outset, Americans celebrated independence on July 4, the date shown on the much-publicized Declaration of Independence, rather than on July 2, the date the resolution of independence was approved in a closed session of Congress.

One of the most enduring myths about Independence Day is that Congress signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. The myth had become so firmly established that, decades after the event and nearing the end of their lives, even the elderly Thomas Jefferson and John Adams had come to believe that they and the other delegates had signed the Declaration on the fourth. Most delegates actually signed the Declaration on August 2, 1776. In a remarkable series of coincidences, both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, two founding fathers of the United States and the only two men who signed the Declaration of Independence to become president, died on the same day: July 4, 1826, which was the United States' 50th anniversary.



# A MORAL COMPASS<sup>13</sup>

# **Directional Principles for Right Living**

Give me your lantern and compass, give me a map, so I can find my way to the sacred mountain. (Psalm 43:3, MSG) O people, the LORD has told you what is good, and this is what he requires of you: to do what is right, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God. (Micah 6:8, NLT)



In Parker and Hart's "The Wizard of Id" comic strip, the knight says to the wizard, "The royal mint has issued a new coin with the king's head on both sides." The wizard thinks that is most appropriate. When asked why, he replied, "It's two-faced, isn't it?"

Our culture is steeped in dishonesty. 'Lying' is often referred to as 'misspeaking', the self-justifying word of the day.

Lying isn't new; in fact it's part of the ancient beginning of mankind when the Source of Lying got his career start. When Satan accused his creator of being untruthful, seducing Eve in the midst of Eden's Paradise.

Man's moral compass has been in an out-of-control spin ever since. "O people," Micah declared, "the LORD has told you what is good." But we human beings reason our way out of this simple fact; we convince ourselves that God is not to be believed, or that somehow He is wrong . . . which is impossible because His whole essence is Truth. This God-character was intrinsic to the Son of God who declared himself to be "the way, the *truth*, and the life" (John 14:6). After one of His encounters with the religious liars of His day He emphasized to His disciples, "And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32).

So lying, with all of it's nuances (dishonesty, misrepresentation, skewing, spinning, distorting, embellishing, etc.), is an accepted part of our culture today. And the result is bondage.

A twelve-year-old boy was an important witness in a lawsuit. One of the lawyers, after cross-examining him severely, said, "Your father has been telling you how to testify, hasn't he?" "Yes," said the boy. "Now," said the lawyer, "tell us how your father told you to testify." "Well," said the boy modestly, "father told me the lawyers would try to entangle me in my testimony; but if I would just be careful and tell the truth, I could tell the same thing every time."

Can we even begin to imagine what society would be like if Truth pervaded every aspect of our lives? I recall with a chuckle the Jim Carey movie "Liar, Liar," which put forth the premise of the attorney being unable to lie.

Someone has said, "Truth is like fine china: It can be broken. It can be mended. But it can never be the same again."

Ponder the words of John Galsworthy: "Honesty of thought and speech and written word is a jewel, and they who curb prejudice and seek honorably to know and speak the truth are the only builders of a better life."

America the Beautiful by Katharine Lee Bates, is a patriotic hymn that originated as a poem written by Katharine Lee Bates in the summer of 1893 after a trip to Colorado Springs. The poem first appeared in The Congregationalist in 1895 and was set to music months later. Bates simplified the text in 1904 and made changes to the third stanza years later to create the words that are known today. From over seventy musical settings, the one now best known was written by S. A. Ward. Many citizens have lobbied Congress to make it the national anthem. The beloved hymn was performed frequently following the terrorist attacks of 11 September 2001.

O beautiful for spacious skies, For amber waves of grain, For purple mountain majesties Above the fruited plain! America! America! God shed His grace on thee And crown thy good with brotherhood From sea to shining sea!

O beautiful for pilgrim feet, Whose stern, impassioned stress A thoroughfare for freedom beat Across the wilderness! America! America! God mend thine every flaw, Confirm thy soul in self-control, Thy liberty in law! O beautiful for heroes proved
In liberating strife,
Who more than self their country loved,
And mercy more than life!

# **DoorOpeners**

I am the Door; anyone who enters in through Me will be saved (will live). He will come in and he will go out [freely], and will find pasture. John 10:9 (AMP)

DOORS ARE FOR BOTH ENTERING AND EXITING. Here, in John 10, Jesus is the Door for His sheep—for both entering into safety and shelter and exiting to liberty and plenty.

Those who came before Jesus, that is, those who were pretending to be the Door (John 5:43; Matt. 24:5), had led the people away from God. Some of them were the Jewish religious leaders: "But woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you shut up the kingdom of heaven against men; for you neither go in *yourselves*, nor do you allow those who are entering to go in" (Matt 23:13, NKJV).

This dual image of Jesus as the Door, or Gate, gives us the total picture of the Christian life. Other religions present a message of restriction without any hope of joy and fulfillment in this present life. A false Christian concept falls into this same misconception of what God has in mind for His people. Jesus explains this to His disciples: "I will not only provide for your security, I will see to it that you can go out and find pasture. I have come so you can have abundant, fulfilling lives."

John 10 is an extension of a Psalm that David wrote about the Lord being the Door and the Shepherd of His people: Psalms 23:1-6 (NLT)

1 The Lord is my shepherd; I have all that I need.2 He lets me rest in green meadows; he leads me beside peaceful streams.3 He renews my strength. He guides me along right paths, bringing honor to his name.4 Even when I walk through the darkest valley, I will not be afraid, for you are close beside me. Your rod and your staff protect and comfort me.5 You prepare a feast for me in the presence of my enemies. You honor me by anointing my head with oil. My cup overflows with blessings.6 Surely your goodness and unfailing love will pursue me all the days of my life, and I will live in the house of the Lord forever.

### CHAPTER 4/ "LET THE SUNSHINE IN"

Conviction!

That's the word that was used.

Over and over. Sermons. Classes. Youth camps. Camp meetings.

"Pray them under conviction." "He was under conviction, but he didn't make a move." "If you're under conviction tonight you need to repent of your sins. I'm giving an altar call and you need to yield to the Holy Spirit and come forward."

So I struggled as a teen with this "conviction." Really, I had no problem with responding . . . except I just didn't know *how* to respond. I just couldn't seem to "believe."

Then it finally happened. One night I went forward and the pastor counseled me there at that "old fashioned altar bench," as it was called, or "mourners' bench." "You have to accept it by faith," I was told.

So I did . . . or tried to. That night I stood outside the small bunkhouse that was the "bedroom" for me and my brother, and looked through the Chinese Elm trees toward the starry skies . . . and talked to God.

"God, I want to believe. I know your Son Jesus died for me, that he lives and that you want to save me. I believe. I accept your offer of eternal life."

It would be months before I had any kind of so-called "spiritual experience." But in those months the Living Word of God led me through the forest of doubt and ignorance to understanding.

In retrospect, I understood Jesus' words concerning the Holy Spirit working in our hearts and minds: "When he comes, he will *convict* the world of guilt in regard to sin and righteousness and judgment: in regard to sin, because men do not believe in me; in regard to righteousness, because I am going to the Father, where you can see me no longer; and in regard to judgment, because the prince of this world now stands condemned" (John 16:8-11, NIV, emphasis mine).

I would read from Romans 10 again and again concerning faith and the gift of salvation. The premise was simple enough: "Brothers, my heart's desire and prayer to God for the Israelites is that they may be saved. . ." (v. 1).

I knew that. I had been told that by Sunday School teachers and preachers and friends. And by the Scripture.

But I would bog down in the following verses. I would struggle with Paul's explanation: "But the right-eousness that is by faith says: 'Do not say in your heart, "Who will ascend into heaven?" (that is, to bring Christ down) or "Who will descend into the deep?" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say? . . ."

"Yes," I would affirm, "But what does it say?" So month after month I would peruse this passage, one of the premier salvation passages offered by evangelists. And month after month I would struggle with its "deep" meaning.

Finally, I focused on the next verses in answer to "what does it say?": "The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart, that is, the word of faith we are proclaiming: That if you confess with your mouth, that Jesus is Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved" (Vv.6-9)." |pq 15>

## Receiving Grace

Do you reign in life? If not, the reason may be that you do not distinguish between praying and taking. There is a profound difference between entreating for a thing and appropriating it. You may admit that God's abundant grace is near you through Jesus Christ, and yet you may not quite see the necessity of learning how to take it. Some people are always telegraphing to heaven for God to send a cargo of blessing to them; but they are not at the wharf-side to unload the vessel when it comes. How many of God's richest blessings for which you have been praying for years have come right close to you, but you do not know how to lay hold of and use them! Note—"They which receive the abundance of grace shall reign" (see Rom. 5:17) The emphasis is not on grace, not on abundance, but on receiving it; and the whole grace of God may be around your life today, but if you have not learned to take it in, it will do you no good.

### Nature Furnishes Illustrations of Grace

Take, for instance, the eucalyptus tree. It seems especially adapted to antidote the gaseous effects of a polluted atmosphere. It is the loftiest timber tree of Australia; it grows especially in malarious districts, sometimes to a height of five hundred feet. It absorbs moisture to a very remarkable extent, and grows with extraordinary rapidity, covering vast barren districts with a huge forest in a few years. And you may enclose seed enough in an envelope to plant an acre. How like the blessed Gospel, making the tree of life to grow in the worst moral marshes, rapidly, beautifully, gloriously covering the deserts with the foliage and fragrance of heaven! And you may distribute the seed so easily and cheaply.

One warm summer afternoon, a bird flew through the open door into a chapel, where service was being conducted. Full of fear it flew backward and forward near the ceiling and against the windows, vainly seeking a way out into the sunshine. "I am the Way," says Jesus, "no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6).


### A Wonder of Grace


